January 5, 2022

The 2022 Kansas Legislature opens on Monday, Jan. 10, with both chambers gaveling in at 2:00 p.m. As of Jan. 5, there have only been a handful of prefiled bills in each chamber. This is the second year of the two-year biennium. For your reference, 2022 House bills start with House Bill 2455. It was prefiled by Rep. Brett Fairchild and would authorize prison inmates to earn blood-donation credit for early discharge from prison. Senate bills begin with Senate Bill 316. It is sponsored by Sen. Oletha Faust-Goudeau and authorizes municipalities to adopt local zoning regulations that establish a minimum distance between group homes in single-family residential zones. Next week, we will publish our first issue highlighting bills introduced by the Legislature.

According to the latest Kansas Department of Revenue data released this week, December revenues were \$72 million, or 9.6% above the revised estimate from November. Compared with December of 2020, the revenue from income, sales, and other excise taxes was 18.2% above the estimate. The revenue numbers increase the likelihood that the elimination of the sales tax on food and other potential tax cuts will receive serious debate.

This week Secretary of State Scott Schwab released his three-point legislative agenda focused on strengthening election laws to enhance election integrity and security. First, Sec. Schwab will be proposing post-election audits for all federal, state, and local elections. Since taking office, Sec. Schwab has conducted more than 300 successful audits with local election officials. His second proposal addresses regular maintenance of the voter rolls. Currently, county election officers must wait two federal election cycles following a confirmation notice to remove inactive voters from the list. The third proposal addresses securing election equipment. Kansas counties have not been connecting voting machines to the internet since 2006. To enhance election security, he is proposing legislation to prohibit Kansas voting machines from being connected to the internet and enhancing security of electronic pollbooks.

Next week, Gov. Laura Kelly will be delivering her State of the State Address on Tuesday, Jan. 11, 2022 at 6:30 p.m. outlining her 2022 legislative agenda.
